It would transfer \$403 million from the budget stabilization account (aka the rainy day fund) to the general fund to be used for support of common schools. With the new revenue forecast and release of this bill the Senate Democrats signaled they would be looking to provide property tax relief in their supplemental budget from existing resources. The Senate D proposal looks very much like Republican bills dropped at the start of session, HB 2303 and SB 6004; both bills would have reduced the state school levy to \$2.40 for one year.
